A few years ago, I wrote a small piece for "Journeys" that consisted primarily of me introducing myself as I took over for Dr. LaRow. To say that a lot has happened since then is an understatement! In March of 2020, like many other schools, Siena closed down due to the COVID lockdown. It was so sad to see the campus empty during beautiful spring weather. The Siena / AMC students all adjusted quickly to this new form of education. The transition to remote learning was certainly not easy for anyone, but Siena faculty and tech services worked hard to make sure our students got the education they deserve. We discovered at lot about the advantages and limitations of remote learning. More importantly we all discovered some things about ourselves too and all those things we sometimes

take for granted: being with friends, walking to class, grabbing a coffee during a break, study groups, and all those daily interactions that make life routine--- and meaningful!

In 2020, there were really no service opportunities for the Summer of Service because of the lockdown, fears of disease transmission, and quarantines. In 2021, the Summer of Service returned, but this time all students had to find domestic programs. All of the Juniors arranged meaningful and valuable experiences within the borders of the US. For this summer of 2022, Child Family Health International (CFHI) is up and running again to provide our students with safe service activities in other nations. The first group of students, who used CFHI a few years back, all had wonderful experiences and I am happy and grateful that these

can be provided to the students once again. All expenses for the Summer of Service continue to be paid by a program endowment fund so there are no out-of-pocket expenses for any of the students whether they go abroad or stay in the US.

We are now facing COVID and its variants, war in Ukraine, rampant inflation, endless political rhetoric, mass shootings, climate change, excess screen time, and monkeypox. People seem to be increasingly angry and volatile, with very little patience and little respect for others. Our program students continue with sharing, compassion, kindness, and concern for others. All of you who are reading this should be proud and grateful for the values instilled in us by a Franciscan education at Siena. The world needs to change and, if we all work together, that can happen.

For our Summer of
Service, we spent the summer
working at a summer camp in
Fayetteville, Georgia. The camp
had a special focus on kids with
neurodiversity, kids from
underserved communities, and
promoting diversity and
acceptance. Working as a staff
coordinator (Nathaniel Kim)
and a program coordinator on
the ropes course (Annamaria
Walden), we met a ton of great
kids and made lifelong friends
with fellow counselors.



During our time, we met many campers whose stories will stay with us forever. One story that particularly stuck with me (Annamaria), was one camper James. At only 10 years old, he was noticeably heavier than other campers. And while other campers and even counselors made fun of his weight while he struggled in some of the outdoor activities like the ropes course, I stayed

with him and encouraged him. From activity to activity, we stayed together, got closer, and had fun. Then, on our last night he shared with me at dinner that he hoped we would have ice cream for dessert because he had only ever seen ice cream on T.V. I was shocked. Not only because I thought ice cream was something that every child ate, but also here was this 10-year-old boy who had never even seen it in person. Siena taught us about food

Siena taught us about food deserts and how some communities don't have access to healthy foods. So while other campers and counselors scoffed at this camper and thought that he only ate ice cream and junk food because of his weight, I knew that he didn't have a choice and that he deserved to be treated just like everyone else.

Besides the campers, we also struggled a lot with upper management and how they treated their minority staff members, even though they preached a commitment to diversity. In particular, there was one staff member who was constantly treated with disrespect and brushed to the

side when she brought up instances where the upper management was being racist. I (Nate) was actually on the same staff level as her, so I began to speak up for her in order to make a change within the camp culture. In the end, we were able to have staff members who made racist comments receive disciplinary action, and we even helped form a diversity committee where staff members could freely talk to upper management about promoting diversity.

Through this experience, we grew a lot as individuals and gained a deeper understanding of service. First, always keep an open mind about others and their experiences. Second, advocacy is a huge part of serving others. And lastly, the service you thought you were going to do, might not be the only service you end up doing.
