

WELCOME FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT OF MISSION

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Greetings of peace.

Francis of Assisi often met people with the simple words of peace and good. His now familiar greeting was, at the time, a bold and powerful challenge to the prevailing wisdom. All around him, there was an unrestrained thirst for more – more power, more property, more possessions. Francis, instead, spread a message of peace, which he considered to be the gift that flows when we live in relationship with God. Inspired by the example of St. Francis, Siena's Mission Team is committed to much more than repeating his greeting of peace and good. We are focused upon addressing the deeper realities to which Francis directs our attention. We're calling on the entire Siena Community to be Siena Saints, and we're here to facilitate that gift that flows when we, as a community, live in relationship with God.



This past year, we were fortunate to have Br. Jason Damon, OFM, join us for his internship. Br. Jason built up the Siena community through his presence in many aspects of campus. At the end of his time, Jason found that serving as a Friar in Residence was his most significant role. Plassmann Hall was his home away from the friary for the year and his interactions with students and the residence hall staff were meaningful. Jason was a great addition to the campus this past year. In late summer, Br. Jason returns to Chicago to complete his studies for the Master of Divinity at the Catholic Theological Union.

Friar recruitment to Siena is a priority of the College – in November Fr. Louis Iasiello, OFM, Ph.D., came for a visit to explore ministering at Siena and as a result joined the friar fraternity this summer. Fr. Lou will be teaching First-Year Seminar, working with the Institute for Leadership Development and sharing his abundant gifts and talents on the Mission Team. In March, the Franciscan Friar postulants (first year of initial formation for men discerning joining the friars) from Holy Name College in Silver Spring, Maryland spent a few days on campus learning about Franciscan Higher Education. During the spring and summer, four additional friars visited campus to explore opportunities for future ministry at Siena.

The world needs more saints – more Siena Saints. We are proud that so many shining examples serve on the Mission Team. In June,

Colleen Sheedy, administrative assistant for the Mission Team, was named the Saint of the Year by the College in recognition of her long-time commitment to Siena.

After leading the Sister Thea Bowman Center for Women the past six years, and most recently as senior director for the mission team, Beth DeAngelis will be leaving her full-time position with us – while continuing to teach emotional intelligence on campus. Beth has been a tremendous partner in ministry and a strong advocate for the development of students' wellness and development of the whole person. She has wonderfully accompanied and mentored students in their journey of faith and meaning and fostered the leadership of women.

It takes intentionality and commitment to be the learning community that our mission statement calls us to be. There are many examples of our partners across campus fulfilling this mission. I hope you enjoy this annual report, which provides a sampling of how we are living out our mission in the spirit of Francis and Clare of Assisi, Bernardine of Siena, Anthony of Padua, Roger Bacon, Thomas Plassmann, Thea Bowman and the long line of Franciscan women and men who contributed to the Franciscan tradition that lives on at Siena College.

STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE (LEADING THE WAY)


Two members of the Mission Team, Br. George Camacho and Ms. Beth DeAngelis, we are a part of the Strategic Planning committee.

The Siena College Mentoring Program has impacted the lives of Saints and Capital Region youth since 1965. Jim Snyder started the program as an initiative supported by Big Brothers and Sisters. Snyder passed away in 2014, but the program continues to serve children, known as Littles, by pairing them with a Siena student, a Big.



STRESS AND ANXIETY RELIEF FOR STUDENTS

- Yoga and Mindfulness in the Chapel 40 students gathered weekly.
- Women's Center Weekly Mentoring Meeting led by senior leaders Skylar Nijhawan and Adrianna Grande. The meetings focused on topics such as: healthy and unhealthy relationships, self-care practices, assertive communication and financial literacy.
- **Mindful Monday** Useful tips, skills and resources to cultivate more mindfulness and less stress. Written by Women Center leader, Maria Paez.

GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE AWARENESS AND ADVOCACY

The Sr. Thea Bowman Center for Women collaborated with Unity House in Troy and Siena Faculty to provide awareness and advocacy opportunities during Domestic Violence awareness month in October.

Women-Up tee shirts were designed and shared on campus to promote awareness. Social work interns developed a social media campaign to highlight domestic violence statistics, and resources.

"Love is Not Abuse" program was led by three Unity House Counselors to provide awareness, empowerment and resources to students. The Sr. Thea Bowman partnered with Dacey Booney's Relationship Violence class for this program.

"Stall stories" featuring information on the Red Zone and the unique vulnerability of LGBTQ+ and Trans couples were created by Social Work interns and posted throughout campus. Dr. Marcela Garces' class translated these into "stories" into Spanish to provide an actionable component to their class learning experience.

SOCIAL/EMOTIONAL LEARNING - DEVELOPING THE WHOLE PERSON

Social/Emotional Learning (SEL) Research

Beth DeAngelis conducted an IRB approved research study on social/emotionalskill development with 20 women students.

UNWomen

Our colleagues at UNWomen joined the Sr. Thea Bowman Center for Women in partnership with Dr. Vera Eccarius-Kelly (Department of Political Science) and Dr. Dirk DeJohn (Department of Social Work and Peace Studies) to discuss the the situation of women on the ground in Ukraine. The narrative focused on women's resilience and strength during times of great challenge.

STUDENT MENTORING

Mentoring students is a large part of the contribution we make to the Siena community.

- The Women's center staff of seven students receives regular mentoring from Sr. Director, Beth DeAngelis.
- Students in Dr. Draucker's Sexual Violence Narratives, worked with Sr. Director, Beth DeAngelis, to develop their final impact projects.
- Students in the course Developing Your Emotional Intelligence receive 1:1 mentoring to cultivate social/emotional skills.
- Spiritual Companionship is available to students interested in cultivating their spiritual life.

MENTAL HEALTH INITIATIVES

The Sr. Thea Bowman Center for Women hosted a Master Class to review the most recent White paper, *Mental Health & Higher Education in New York* by Mental Health Association in New York State, Inc (MHANYS).

Community partners from MHANYS and NYS Department of Mental Health presented to an audience of Siena students, faculty and administrators.
