

FACULTY UPDATES

Yuyang Pu joined Siena College in the fall of 2022. Besides teaching 4 courses, during the fall semester, he hosted an information session regarding the white paper movement in China and discussed the country's zero-covid policy and the protests it sparked. Dr. Pu attended the *Southern Political Science Association Annual Meeting* in Florida in January, where he presented two papers titled "*Killing Two Birds with One Stone: Heterogeneous Effects of Anticorruption Messages*" and "*Corruption, Sex Scandal, and Female Underrepresentation: A Survey Experiment in China*". In the current spring semester, Dr. Pu is offering a course on propaganda and censorship, providing students with the opportunity to conduct their own research projects, which may be developed into conference papers or even published works. Dr. Pu also enjoyed teaching *Contemporary U.S. Politics* and found teaching it to be quite rewarding.

Len Cutler and his Summer CURCA Research Scholar Sarah Falgiatano presented a jointly researched study entitled "An Assessment of the Biden Foreign Policy Doctrine" at the 54th Annual Meeting of the Northeastern Political Science Association held in Boston. They hope to continue their CURCA supported research this Summer. Dr. Cutler was appointed by Colonie Town Supervisor Peter Crummey to serve as a member of the Town Ethics Board for a term of three years beginning January 2023.Dr. Cutler has been interviewed by the local media including the Times Union, Channels 6 and 10 concerning the legal/Constitutional issues raised as a result of the NYS Senate's Judiciary Committee refusing to confirm Governor Hochul's nomination of Hon. Hector Lasalle to be the next Chief Judge of the NYS Court of Appeals. Dr. Cutler will be taking a group of students to the Court of Appeals for a tour, and to hear oral arguments in April.

Vera Eccarius-Kelly enjoyed her sabbatical during fall semester 2022 and spent extended periods of time in Germany and in Cuba. In Germany, besides visiting family, she attended a number of protests against the Iranian regime, including the massive gatherings held in Berlin that attracted 800,000 participants. She interviewed a series of Kurds from Iran in the diaspora to learn more about their mobilization efforts around the principles of *Jin, Jiyan, Azadi* (Woman, Life, Freedom), which is rooted in 40 years of Kurdish struggle. In Cuba, she spent time with community leaders, rural and urban activists and artists, and explored the use of art to expand the boundaries of political expression and dissent. Throughout her sabbatical, she continued her participation in WAMC radio Roundtable discussions (regional NPR), collaborated with national NPR on an interview related to women's protests in Iran, and supported asylum applicants with submissions of expert witness reports for their court hearings. She published a Review Essay of *Diaspora as translation and decolonization* by Ipek Demir in *Politics, Religion, & Ideology* 23, no. 3 (2022): 374-376. Dr. Eccarius-Kelly and POSC major Kiley Lenahan have been selected as 2022/2023 recipients of the Siena College Award for Excellence in recognition of their long-standing work with ECAR (Every Campus a Refuge). The ECAR program at Siena has been hosting the Danesh family from Afghanistan on campus.

FACULTY UPDATES

Taewoo Kang's review of The Other Divide: Polarization and Disengagement in American Politics by Yanna Krupnikov and John B. Ryan (New York: Cambridge University Press. 2022. 250 pp.) was published in Public Opinion Quarterly in 2022. Dr. Kang presented his co-authored research on how people view television advertising and online advertising differently at the 118th Annual Meeting of the American Political Science Association (Political Communication Pre-Conference, Montreal, Canada). While in Montreal, he chaired a panel on Creating Engaged Learning Environments. In collaboration with the Midwest Political Science Association, Dr. Kang has been mentoring a Ph.D. student from an unrepresented group since September 2022. As the Siena College Research Institute's Inaugural Faculty Fellow, Dr. Kang taught a class entitled "Siena Poll: Gateway to Public Opinion" in Fall 2022. Students in the class conducted interviews during the 2022. election cycle and interacted with various quest speakers (e.g., directors of polling organizations, pollsters, and CEO of data management/ analytics company). Dr. Kang won the School of Liberal Arts Tenure-Track Outstanding Teacher- Scholar Award in October 2022. In 2023, Dr. Kang will serve as a member of the 2023 Paul Lazarsfeld Best Paper Award Committee for the Political Communication section of the American Political Science Association. In Spring 2023, students in Dr. Kang's Introduction to Political Communication class will work with the news director of a local TV station, a national newspaper's reporter, the editor of a local newspaper, a former U.S. Congressperson, and political campaign/public relations specialists.

Dan Lewis and his coauthors on "Team Kansas" published, "Transitioning Opinion? Assessing the Dynamics of Public Attitudes toward Transgender Rights," in *Public Opinion Quarterly* in May. The study explores how attitudes toward transgender rights have developed in the past decade, highlighting shifts in key factors underlying these attitudes. The team also published, "Taking Perspective of the Stories We Tell about Transgender Rights: The Narrative Policy Framework" in the *Policy Studies Journal* in September. This experimental study explores how narratives may be used to influence attitudes on transgender rights. Dr. Lewis presented another study from Team Kansas, "Cultural Threat, Intergroup Solidarity, and Attitudes toward Transgender Rights," at the 2022 Midwest Political Science Association conference. The Team also won a grant from the Williams Institute at UCLA to conduct a survey experiment on "Shaping Public Attitudes on Sports Participation by Transgender Youth" and their prior work on these attitudes was highlighted in a Monkey Cage posting at the Washington Post in May. Dr. Lewis also published a study on "Making the Vote (In)Accessible: Election Administration Laws and Turnout among People with Disabilities" with his coauthor, Dr. Robynn Kuhlmann, in *Politics, Groups, and Identities* in October.

FACULTY UPDATES

Laurie Naranch published Chapter 6: "What Reassurance? What Reality?: Governor Cuomo, COVID-19, and the Politics of Masculine Protection" in the collection *Persevering during the Pandemic Stories of Resilience, Creativity, and Connection,* edited by Deborah A. Macey, Michelle Napierski- Prancl and David Staton (Rowman and Littlefield 2022). She gave a research paper on aging and political theory at the Northeast Political Science Association in Boston in November 2022 and she will present a revised version at the Western Political Science Association Meeting in San Francisco in April 2023 where she will also be on a panel about the book *Slow Culture and the American Dream* inspired by the slow food movement. She will be a commentator at the Arendt Center at Bard College for their March conference "Judgment, Pluralism, and Democracy: On the Desirability of Speaking with Others". Dr. Naranch also looks forward to working with her Honors Body Politics class this spring and developing the Free Use Closet pop-up experiences started by Kiley Lenahan with other interested students. Finally, Dr. Naranch continues to be active in her community as a Zoning Board of Appeals member and as a newly drafted member of the town Ethics Committee.

Ausra Park published a chapter titled "Domestic Contestations in Lithuania's Foreign and Security Policy: Who Calls the Shots?" in 2022 (co-authored with Dr. Gerda Jakstaite-Confortola) in *Small States and Security in Europe: Between National and International Policymaking*, eds. Tomas Weiss and Geoffrey Edwards, Routledge: London and NY. (https://www.routledge.com/Small-States-and-

Security-in-Europe-Between-National-and-International/Weiss-Edwards/p/book/9780367535513). Over the summer, she has also attended and presented three papers at selective international conferences taking place in Portugal (Conference for European Studies), Slovenia (European Politics and Gender Conference), and Sweden (Gender in Diplomacy workshop). Dr. Park also gave several lectures at the Lithuanian Military Academy and conducted research on women presidents and interviewed women diplomats in Latvia. Also, two of Dr. Park's international relations and policy- relevant analyses appeared in the *Australian Outlook* published by the Australian Institute of International Affairs. She is currently revising two publications. The first one examines the socio- demographic profiles of Lithuania's foreign service at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs staff and ambassadorial levels over the past 30 years (the 1991-2021 time period); the second publication is a comparative study analyzing the gender aspect in the diplomatic corps of the three Baltic States. Dr. Park's next project (a book chapter) will explore growing and disconcerning tendencies of anti-gender/ genderphobia policies and rhetoric in the Baltic States in light of the backlash that women's ascent in politics since 2020—Lithuania and Estonia presently have the most gender-balanced executives in the history of the two states—has (unexpectedly?) produced.

POLITICAL SCIENCE SOCIETY

This past year, Political Science Society has been active in helping raise student awareness of events going on in the political world. With bi-weekly meetings to discuss the current state of events, we seek to raise our collective understanding of the current political world. We have also been active in events in the Siena Community.

This Fall our Voter Friendly Campus Committee visited First Year Seminar classrooms to educate Freshmen about registering to vote and requesting absentee ballots. They also tabled in residence halls and the SSU in order to get the whole campus to be registered and request their ballot as well. The Voter Friendly Campus Committee consisted of Chair Carly Fanning '23 and members Lauren Waters '23, Amelia Risnit '24, Emily Atassi '25, Jimmy Hamilton '25, and Kristen Kiernan '25. This winter we had an election to nominate our next VFC chair and Kristen Kiernan will be taking over.

Last spring we also organized an event on the Supreme Court, looking at its politicization and the way that the Court is currently functioning. That event brought law school professors Ilya Soman from George Mason University and Ava Ayers from Albany Law School to campus as well as the Hon. Mae D'Agostino '77. The event also included a presentation from Don Levy, Director of the Siena College Research Institute, Sami Deragon '22, and Daniel Solis '24,aout the results of a poll their national survey on attitudes toward the Supreme Court. Nicholas Discala '22 moderating an engaging discussion about the changing nature of the politics of judicial nominations and the role of the court in our government today.

Citizen Lobbying & Advocacy

Dr. Lewis' POSC 210 Citizen Lobbying & Advocacy class visited the New York Capitol on January 27 and met with Assemblyman Phil Steck and staff from the Senate Finance Committee in preparation for their lobbying projects. Teams of students will be advocating for the passage of a range of policies, from a cap on insulin prices to the Dignity in Death law.

Info Session about China's White Paper Movement

In December 2022, Dr. Yuyang Pu held an information session on the white paper movement in China. During this session, Dr. Pu discussed China's zero-covid policy, its implications on Chinese citizens' daily life and China's economy. Moreover, he also informed the Siena Community about a tragic fire incident in Xinjiang, online censorship about this incident, and the protests it sparked across the country. Additionally, he compared the protests in 2022 and 1989 and highlighted the rarity of such protests in China.

Every Campus a Refuge

Dr. Eccarius-Kelly and Kiley Lenahan will receive the Siena College Award for Excellence in recognition of their long-standing work with ECAR at the MVP Arena on February 12, at 2 pm.
